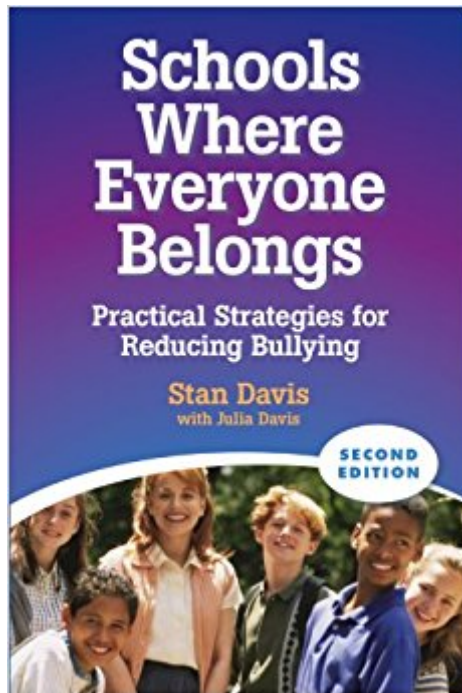


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# Schools Where Everyone Belongs: Practical Strategies For Reducing Bullying
